<u>CHRISTIAN CONDUCT – PART 3 –</u> <u>THE SHEEP'S RESPONSIBILITY TO THE CHIEF SHEPHERD</u>

--1st THESSALONIANS 5:16-18--

INTRODUCTION:

In Paul's concluding section of 1st Thessalonians, he exhorted the church on Christian conduct. These exhortations have been grouped into relationships that exist in the church and how we are to conduct ourselves in those relationships. Paul began with the relationship of shepherd and the flock under his care. Next, he exhorted the Thessalonians on the inter-relationship of the sheep, or how we are to conduct ourselves toward others in the church, especially towards those sheep who are struggling.

Today we will look at a third relationship, the relationship between the sheep and the Chief Shepherd, the Lord Jesus Christ. What is our responsibility in our relationship to the Lord Jesus? This is the most important relationship that we have within the community of the church. If God's flock is to be healthy, then the relationship between the sheep and the Chief Shepherd must be right. Paul gives three exhortations or commands for us to obey. These are not Paul's commands, but what God expects of His sheep.

If this relationship is not right, then the church cannot be healthy. Paul exhorted us to do three things to be in right relationship with the Lord Jesus, or to be in God will. We are to constantly rejoice, we are to constantly pray, and we are to constantly be thankful. These three we must do for they make up God's will for us who are in Christ Jesus.
